# The Future of the Julienne

- **Dr. Kurt Stanic, DPS interim Superintendent** and **John Carr, DPS Chief Construction Officer** will be present to discuss the Future of the Julienne Buildings (formerly Dayton Christian and Stivers school for the Arts) at 325 Homewood Avenue.
- **Police Officer** from the 5<sup>th</sup> district will be present at start of meeting to address concerns.

Since May of 2006 FONIA has been working to save Julienne from Demolition. While the buildings are currently standing, its future is likely demolition. In 2007, Julienne was unanimously deemed historically and architecturally significant by the Dayton Landmarks Commission. FONIA has successfully completed a **National Register of Historic Places Nomination** for the complex. It has been accepted by the State of Ohio in 2008 and is currently being reviewed by the Keeper of National Register of Historic Places. In November of 2008, the Dayton Public School Board voted to turn the clock back to July, 5 2006. FONIA sees this as the beginning of the end and is disappointed in this action.

Why must Julienne be demolished? The short answer is **Money** and Five Oaks desire to have a public school within walking distance for our children. In reality the answer is much longer and its comes down to not the total cost of the buildings (renovation or new construction) to the tax payers, but the cost to the local school district. In this case Dayton Public would need to pay a larger percent of the project cost. Columbus set the project budgets through it school construction program run by the Ohio School Facility Commission. Dayton joined the program and about 60% of the cost of the new school is funded through Columbus, the rest must be payed for by the local district (DPS).

With this stated, a School Board who wants to rehabilitate its historic school buildings have successfully done so. About 50% of the historic schools in Ohio have been rehabbed, Dayton has rehabbed about 2% of our schools. DPS currently has the funds to rehabilitate Julienne, but would like to keep it in reserve to fix problems with the current new construction projects. Money for construction is an independent fund and is unrelated to the to the levy we just pasted. **Dayton's Future does not have to Demolish our past.**

**Bulk Waste Pick-Up Information:**

The City of Dayton provides residents with four bulk-waste pick-ups a year at no cost. **Bulk waste pick-ups must be scheduled in advance by calling 333-4800.** Residents can call between new expanded hours of 7:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Bulk waste items are to be set out after 3:00 p.m. of the day *before* the scheduled pick-up. City crews begin pick-ups at 7:00 a.m.

**Bulk Waste Guidelines**

- You must separate your metal items (stoves, refrigerators, etc.) from other bulk items. Remember to remove refrigerator doors.
- All loose and small items must be securely contained, bundled or bagged for easy pickup.
- The City cannot pick up concrete, rocks, brick blocks, sand, gravel or hazardous waste.
- Yard waste (brush, hedges, tree limbs, etc.) must be tied in bundles not larger than 4 feet long and 18 inches in diameter. Bundles are limited to 25 pounds each.
- The City **cannot** pick up grass clippings.
