### **Julienne and Historic District Update**

City of Dayton Plan Board Voted unanimously to recommend the HD-3 zoning designation (local historic designation) for the National Register listed Julienne Girls High School (Dayton Christian) Located at 325 Homewood.

What this means is in 2 months the City Commission must make a ruling on the historic zoning for the Building. A ruling in favor of HD-3 zoning would save the existing structure from demolition. Without the designation the building will be demolished to make way for a new school in its place. There is a chance that Five Oaks and the surrounding neighborhood could lose its public school if the property becomes locally zoned historic. Dayton Public Schools has threatened to move the proposed school to another location. Let the DPS Superintendent and School Board and City Commission know how you feel about this.

The Grafton/Rockwood/Wroe and the Forest/Squirrel Belmonte local historic designation is proceeding slowly. The new local historic districts will be known as 'Historic Five Oaks'. We hope to have a Landmarks date set in February. If successful at Landmarks, we will proceed to Plan Board and then City Commission.

## Winter snow removal

**“Ice & Snow, Take It Slow”** is the approach advised by the City of Dayton Division of Street Maintenance for the 2008-2009 winter driving season. City of Dayton crews will work to keep roadways as clear and safe as possible, despite limited supplies of road salt caused by a significant cost increase over previous years.

Priorities:

- Highways/freeways and ramps
- Thoroughfares (such as Salem Avenue, Main Street, Smithville Road, Third Street, etc.)
- Hills and bridges
- Arterials (such as Catalpa Drive, Hoover Avenue, Troy Street, Patterson Road, etc.)

The City of Dayton provides residents with four bulk-waste pick-ups a year at no cost. **Bulk waste pick-ups must be scheduled in advance by calling 333-4800.** Residents can call between new expanded hours of 7:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Bulk waste items are to be set out after 3:00 p.m. of the day *before* the scheduled pick-up. City crews begin pick-ups at 7:00 a.m.
